

CHURCH OBJECTS

The Roman Catholic church is un-alterably opposed to letting physi-cians end the lives of incurable patients, Rev. Dr. J. P. Trency de-clared to-day, commenting on a Ber-lin report that the Nazi government planned to sanction painless killing of incurables if requested by patient or relatives. or relatives.

"The state can take away human "Where there is no crime, there should be no death punishment. It is a very arbitrary measure to put a man to death merely because he has some disease.

Even if the sufferer gave his con-sent, such an act would be tantamount to self-destruction. The church couldn't allow it.' Dr. Wilbur H. Harris, chairman of the medical board of the Hospital for Incurables, thought that "euthan-asia" should be left severely alone in Canada. "It can't come here until public opinion on the question is very different than what it is now," Dr. Harris stated.

3,000 CHINESE GREET NEW REPUBLIC'S LION

Sways Rhythmically Down Elizabeth St. While Crowds Cheer, Firecrackers Bang

China's lion, which has been awake for the past 22 years, paid a visit to Toronto on Sunday. Glittering with hundreds of tiny mirrors, the lion tripped like a debutanto up and down Elizabeth St., and was apparently very proud of its gaudy whiskers.

Royally attired in yellow, green, red, blue, black and white sliks, the lion swayed rhythmically in a jungle dance of joy as firecrackers exploded and the shrill, exultant cries of some 3,000 of the city's Chinese population heralded its approach.

The lion was advancing in honor of the seventh anniversary of the organization of the Dart Coon Club in this city. The lion only awoke on Oct. 10, 1911, when cries of "Away with the Manchus" aroused it from 5,000 years of slumber and brought the death of the Tsing dynasty.

Representing the most loyal of the republican Chinese, the Dart Coon men, and their sons, who fought, financed and inspired the revolution, the Toronto members of the organization, led by the lion, were cheered by Chinatown. Despite the light rain, spectators jammed both sides of Elizabeth St.
