VERSATILE STUDENTS EARN UNIVERSITY FEES

Oil Tankers, Fisheries, Music Sales Posts Studded With Ambitious Youths

SOME DISAPPOINTED

Jobs enjoyed, or endured, this summer by students at the University of Toronto were as versatile as the students themselves, and varied from being a waiter on an oil tanker in the Caribbean Sea to selling vegetables from a truck in Toronto; from catching fish in the Pacific to playing a piano in a radio station.

The selling job attracts people like J. H. Campbell, who borrowed the family car and sold furnace blowers and farm implements. "I made \$150 on commission," he said. Vendors of magazines, Bibles, maps, garden equipment, motor cleaners, books and lessons, pianos and washing machines seek students' services, inquiry revealed.

Then there is the conventional summer job, cook's assistant at a camp, waiter on a lake boat, gasoline station attendant, ice-house clerk, Arthur Heywood had one at a summer camp that paid him \$5 a week and maintenance for 13 weeks. "He brought the whole \$65 home with him," his sister said.

Jobs easier to find
"Jobs were easier to get this year than last," students say. "We had any number of offers of jobs," declared E. A. Macdonald of the Students' Administration Council, "particularly for those who could sell."
