'It's all right for a change,' said David. 'We've been in Toronto for a week and we've had a swell time but it's awful noisy.' The first thrill was when they arrived at the home of L. L. Sproule, who is a Toronto police officer and rides around in a real radio cruiser looking for crooks and is a friend of their dad's, P.C. Sproule's two stalwart sons, Donald, 12, and Arthur, 7, have acquired Beulah and Janet on a tour of Toronto that has been full of guaranteed thrills.

They saw Ald. Bill Croft's lion at Riverdale zoo, they rode on their first street cars and took their first lake trip on the island ferries. TO PRESENT OPERAS AT LEAF'S STADIUM

Seven Thousand Audience Is Possible for Week's Entertainment in August
Star-roofed opera will again invade Toronto in August as three years ago it pitched camp at Hamilton's Point. Again, baseball is the set-up; this time, instead of the defunct stadium at the island, with double fare to get there—the New York Grand Opera Co. will stage four operas at the living Maple Leaf Stadium from Aug. 5 (Ill) Aug. 13, allowing nights off for possible rain. The only thing to build for opera there is the stage, with tents for dressing rooms. The audience will occupy 7,000 of the 12,000 or more seats available for baseball. The four operas will be Carman, Trovatore, Aida, Rigoletto. Principals will be chosen from the 'Met,' as well as from the N.Y. Opera Co., which is the same one that last summer played twice in Montreal, Quebec and Three Rivers and two years ago in New York. Next week Mr. Dell 'Orefice, general director, will be in Toronto to confer with stadium officials and to plan the large stage for special lighting effects. The price of admission will range from 25 cents to \$1.00.
