POLICE SEE SIMILARITY IN MOVIE KILLINGS

Intensify Hunt for Son of Actress Clubbed to Death

Hollywood, June 29.—(UP)—Police noted similarity between the murders of a popular actress of the silent movie era and a pretty Russian dancer today as they hunted for Campbell McDonald, 28-year-old son of the actress.

McDonald has not been seen since the day before his 58-year-old mother, Margaret Campbell, was beaten to death with a hammer in the small room she shared with him.

Both cases also were similar to the slugging of Dolia Bogart, 17-year-old actress. In each instance the victim was clubbed. All three were connected with drama classes of Los Angeles City college night school.
