Injured Cowboy Leading Competitor

In the week prior to the
High River rodeo, where he
suffered disabling injuries,
Gid Garstead of Veteran, Al-
berta, had been well on the
way to regaining his 1959
Brahma bull riding title.

Close to the top in 1960, he
was well in the lead this year
with 1219 points, as opposed
to 891 for runner-up Wilf
Gerlitz, when he suffered a
severely fractured leg in the
bull riding event at High Riv-
er.

Last year's title holder, Leo
Brown of Czar, Alberta, while
placing 7th with 430
points at the end of June,
was the only contestant to
make a qualifying ride on
the formidable animals at the
High River rodeo.
