

SPLENDID DISPLAY OF HANDICRAFTS

At the Kalamalka Women's Institute Meeting—Other News of Oyama

Oyama, May 18.—The Kalamalka Women's Institute gave an "At Home," on Wednesday afternoon, which was very well attended by the ladies of the district, and also by the members of the Okanagan Centre and Winfield Institutes, to whom invitation had been sent. The hall and tables were prettily decorated and the refreshments which were served were most excellent and very daintily served. There was a splendid display of Institute handicrafts and home cookery. These included beautiful samples of lace and embroidery work, basketry, bead work. Hayward gave a pianoforte selection and also supplied the song accompaniment.
